The Covid-19 pandemic has significantly impacted our lives, requiring us to urgently respond to emerging issues. Whilst this may have restricted our response to some of our priority areas, we have continually been creative in overcoming the challenges we have faced, ensuring that communities remain safe.

This newsletter is the first of a quarterly update designed to share with partners the great work that is being achieved by everyone.

Update on CSP Priorities

City Centre & Street Sleepers

The total number of tents in the city reduced from 18 to 3 during 2019/20. Building on this success, a new vision for homelessness services is being developed centred around a single coordination point for multiagency needs assessment and better accommodation with 24/7 intensive support provided onsite.

Serious Violence Prevention

The CSP is establishing a Serious Violence Prevention Group in response to the proposed Serious Violence Bill 2019-2020. The group will develop a Strategy which will focus on areas such as the Night Time Economy, Serious Violence and Serious Organised Crime, and Violence Against Women and Girls.

Area Based Working (Butetown/Splott/Tremorfa)

3 partnership groups have been established. The Resilience group covers tactical interventions and empowering residents to deal with issues important to them. The Environment group focuses on the impacts of drug crime and the Aspirations group works to divert young people away from drug crime, promoting employment opportunities and supporting community groups.



Prevent and CONTEST

The Prevent Team supports projects in schools and communities to safeguard vulnerable individuals at risk of radicalisation. Cardiff's Prevent Strategy and Programme Delivery Plan 2019/21, approved by the CONTEST Board, includes actions to mitigate risks identified in the Counter Terrorist Local Profile (CTLP).

'Ask for Ani'

Victims of domestic abuse urged to 'Ask for Ani' at pharmacies. The code word scheme will offer a 'vital' lifeline to all victims.

The APCC (Association of Police and Crime Commissioners) is aiming for over 2,300 Boots pharmacies to run this scheme, as well as 247 independent community pharmacies. All will have access to the materials and posters (Ask for ANI materials / Ask for ANI & Safe Spaces). Pharmacies have also been provided with training materials and guidance for staff.

The Census 2021

A Census has taken place every 10 years since 1801. The Census is vital to all of us! It is very important you take part, and is compulsory by law. It helps us understand what our society needs now and what it is likely to need in the future. The information it collects helps plan and fund services in your area of work or community. This could include transport, education and healthcare.

Census 2021 is planned for Sunday 21st March 2021. It will be the first digital-first census and you will be able to access it on any device. You will get an access code from the Office for National Statistics (ONS). Then simply go online and enter the code into the secure website to get started. ONS will be in contact nearer the time to let you know what you need to do.

ONS are aiming to make it easy for everyone to take part in Census 2021. But, if you need help, there is an online help area and help by phone, webchat, email, social media or text message. If you are not able to get online or need help completing the census online, there will be Census Support Centres across England and Wales. There will also be guidance in a range of languages and accessible formats.

Census 2021 will help give the best picture of the needs of everyone living in England and Wales. Without the census, it would be much more difficult to provide the services you and your community need.

£10 million additional support for Welsh Charities

The Moondance Foundation Covid-19 relief fund has earmarked an additional £10 million in 2021 to distribute to Welsh charities and organisations who are supporting those struggling as a direct result of Covid.

Diane Engelhardt, Chair of Moondance, "2020 has been a difficult year for so many people in Wales. When the pandemic hit, we immediately wanted to help and launched a Covid-19 Relief Fund. Since March 2020, we have donated £7.5 million to over 800 charities and organisations in Wales but there is still much to be done.

The impact of Covid-19 is set to continue well into 2021 as lockdowns continue, unemployment rises and the enormous task of protecting the population through vaccination is in a full-on race against the rise in coronavirus cases."
