


Population Estimates by Age Group

Key Points:

- In the period 1991 2020, Cardiff saw a population increase of 72,261 residents
- Cardiff has seen a proportionally larger increase in it's population aged 16-64, rising from 63.7% to 67.3% of the total population
- Cardiff's population aged 0-15 is 18.4% of total population and 14.3% are aged 65+








2018-based Local Authority Population Projections by Age Group

Key Points:

- 2018-based Population projections indicate a slow down in population growth, projecting an increase of 24,642 residents over 25 years (2018-2043), compared with an increase of 65,063 over the previous 25 years (1993-2018).
- Population projections for Cardiff indicate a growth in those aged 65+, increasing from 14.1% of the total population in 2018 to 17.6% in 2043, although this continues to be below the comparative figures for Wales. However, Cardiff will see faster growth in the number aged 65+ (33.2% increase) by 2043 than Wales (30.6%).
- Proportionally both the 0-15 and 16-64 age categories are projected to decrease their share of the total population by 1.7 and 1.8 percentage points, respectively, and in absolute terms the number of those aged 0-15 is projected to decline by 2,045.








Ethnicity

Key Points:

- The 2011 Census showed that 15.3% of Cardiff's population belonged to a non-white ethnic group, this is well above the Wales-wide proportion of 4.4%
- Time series estimates show that the percentage of people in Cardiff who are black, Asian and minority ethnic has been relatively stable between 2012 and 2021, although the figure has continued to be well above the Welsh average.

- · Lowest 'Anxiety' level, matching the UK figure and comparing favourably with Wales









Key Points:

- Cardiff's average rating for Life Satisfaction, feeling Worthwhile and Happiness have exceeded the 7/10 mark since 2011/12. However, 2020/21 saw incremental drops across all of these indicators of personal well-being, presumably as a result of the pandemic.
- Levels have generally been below the Wales and UK averages for Life Satisfaction, feeling Worthwhile and for Happiness
- Over the last 5 years, anxiety levels have seen an upward trend and, with the exception of 2020/21, have been above the Wales and UK averages













Percentage of Children in Relative Low Income Families

- Since 2016/17, the percentage has increased with a noticeable increase in 2019/20 (from 18.7% to 20.7%)








- There is an 11 percentage point difference when comparing Cardiff's least/most deprived communities, with the gap increasing compared to the previous years







Uptake of MMR2 by Age 4

Key Points:

- Cardiff has one of the lowest MMR2 vaccination uptake rates in Wales, 87.4%
- Target immunisation rate is 95%, although no local authority in Wales currently meets this target
- The City & Cardiff South GP cluster has particularly low levels of uptake, and has seen a decline in recent years
- The best performing clusters in Cardiff are still below the national target





Percentage of Key Stage 2 Pupils Achieving the Expected Level (L4+) in the Core Subject Indicator, 1999-2017














Percentage of people aged 65+ who reported their general health as being very good or good

- Time series data (available up until 14/15) shows an improving trend
- Historic data showed that at ward level, the 65 year old male healthy life expectancy inequality gap as 10.5 years and 12.1 years for females. Males in Adamsdown can expect to spend a quarter (24.8%) of their remaining life in good health compared to an expected two-thirds (65.4%) for those living in Lisvane. For females the figures are 23.5% and 56.9% respectively. Data is not available for this beyond 2013.









Percentage of people aged 65+ reporting they received the right information or advice when they needed it





Percentage of people aged 65+ reporting they live in the right home for them – 2019/20










Percentage of Households in Poverty (i.e. Material Deprivation)








Percentage of Low Birth Weight Babies



Percentage of Adults Eating 5 or More Portions of Fruit and Vegetables a Day

















Rough Sleepers per 10,000 Persons

- Between 2018-19 and 2019-20, Cardiff's estimated number of rough sleepers was relatively unchanged, falling slightly from 100 to 92












To what extent do you agree or disagree with this statement: My neighbourhood is a place where people get on well together and help each other? 2020 Deprivation Fifth









- Cardiff has dipped below the Welsh average for feeling safe when walking in the local area and when travelling (National Survey for Wales 2020/21).
- Respondents living in the most deprived areas of the city are more likely to feel unsafe compared to those living in the least deprived areas of the city (Ask Cardiff Survey 2016-18).
- Less than half of respondents felt safe walking in the city centre after dark with the percentage dropping from 44.2% in 2017 to 37% in 2020. In 2020, only 25% of respondents with a disability and 30% of female respondents felt safe (Ask Cardiff Survey 2020).







Percentage of Clients Accessing Substance Misuse Services who Reported an Improvement in their Quality of Life



Percentage of Clients Accessing Substance Misuse Services who Reported an Improvement in their Quality of Life: Cardiff, 2015/16 - 2020/21







- The unemployment rate in Cardiff for the year ending June 2021 was the third lowest out of the UK's Core Cities (5.1%). However, the rate was above the Wales average and second only to Newport. It was also just above the Great Britain average.
- Since reaching a high of 9.9% for the year ending June 2013, unemployment in Cardiff has seen a general downward trend with the rise in 2021 most likely relating to the impact of Covid-19.
- Since the last Well-being assessment, unemployment has fallen from 6.0% (year ending June 2016) to 5.1%








Unemployment Rate of the Economically Active Population age 16+ (Claimant Count Rate/Deprivation Fifth)

Key Points:

- The pandemic's impact on unemployment caused the claimant count rate in Cardiff to double in the spring of 2020, although this figure has been on a downward trajectory since May 2021 and now matches the UK average. However, it remains above the pre-pandemic level.
- Unemployment is not felt evenly across the city, with claimant count rate being 7.8 percentage points higher for the most deprived fifth of the population compared to the least deprived fifth.








GVA per Head in Cardiff

Key Points:

- In 2019, GVA per head in Cardiff stood at £32,333, well above the Welsh average and slightly exceeding the UK average
- However, the large gap in GVA per head between Cardiff and certain Core Cities, namely Manchester and Edinburgh, reveals that Cardiff needs to make progress in this area
- Between 2015 and 2019, GVA per head in Cardiff rose by roughly 13% and consistently remained above the Wales and UK averages








Gross Disposable Household Income per Head

Key Points:

- In 2019, gross disposable household income in Cardiff stood at £17,431, virtually equal to the Welsh average, but significantly lower than the UK average (£21,433) and the level seen in certain Core Cities, namely Bristol and Edinburgh.
- Between 2016 and 2019, gross disposable household income in Cardiff rose by 9.6%, slightly above the 8.6% increase in the UK average during the same period.
- Over the last 20 years, gross disposable income in Cardiff has been on a general increasing trajectory, however the rate of increase has decelerated slightly since 2008-09, coinciding with the global financial crisis.







Key Points:

- Provisional results for 2021 show that the percentage of employee jobs with hourly pay below the living wage stood at 11.6%
- This percentage is significantly below the UK and Wales averages, as well as the majority of other Core Cities and all other local authorities in Wales
- Between 2020 and 2021, the percentage of employee jobs with hourly pay below the living wage decreased by 2.7 percentage points (14.3% vs 11.6%)
- This data reflects the success of Cardiff's Real Living Wage movement







Percentage of Population Aged 16-64 Qualified to NVQ4+ (Degree Level or Equivalent)

Key Points:

- In 2020, the percentage of Cardiff's adult population qualified to degree level or equivalent stood at just below 50%, comfortably above the Welsh and UK averages, and above the majority of other Core Cities.
- Between 2016 and 2020, this percentage was on a broadly increasing trajectory in Cardiff
- Since 2004, the percentage of people qualified to degree level in Cardiff has remained consistently above the Wales and UK averages










Percentage of people attending or participating in arts, culture or heritage activities at least 3 times in a year

Key Points:

- In 2019-20, Cardiff led Wales in the percentage of its residents participating in cultural life, with 84% attending at least three events during the year
- This rate exceeds the Welsh average by 13 percentage points but is broadly unchanged from 2017-18
- The most and least deprived fifths of Cardiff's population are separated by 17.4 percentage points in terms of participation in at least one cultural activity in the past year, with the latter being far more likely to attend a cultural activity.









Percentage of People Aged 16+ who can Speak Welsh

Key Points:

- At 10%, the percentage of people aged 16+ in Cardiff who can speak Welsh falls below the Welsh average of 16%
- The percentage of Welsh speakers in Cardiff remained relatively static between 2016-17 and 2019-20, rising from 9% to 10% during this period
- Welsh Government data from 2019-20 has the percentage of adults (16+) in Cardiff that speak Welsh as 10% but includes a further 4% who report that they have some Welsh language skills, which would increase the overall figure to 14% of Cardiff residents who can speak at least some level of Welsh.






Per Capita CO2 Emissions

Key Points:


- BEIS data shows that Cardiff has the second highest figure for CO2 emissions per capita out of the UK's 'Core Cities'
- However, Cardiff's emissions have reduced since 2016, from 5.3t to 4.4t, and have been consistently below overall figures for the UK and Wales
- Transport contributes the most to CO2 emissions, at 41.2%







Cardiff CO2 Emissions by Main Emission Type (% of Total Emissions), 2015-2019




Sustainable Transport Modal Shift

Key Points:


• In the 2019/20 Transport Survey, 51.2% of respondents travelled to work using sustainable modes of transport, a 6% increase compared to 2016/17. This is in line with the Council's 50:50 modal split target. There has been a significant shift in cycling as a mode of travel, from 10% in 2016/17 to 15% in 2019/20.

If currently in employment, how often do you travel by the following types of transport when commuting to or from your usual place of work? 2019






Key Points:

- Cardiff's NO2 levels have slightly decreased since 2015, from 19μg/m3 to 16μg/m3


Average NO2 Concentration at Residential Dwelling Locations (µg/m3), 2019


Key Points:

- In terms of the Green Flag Award, Cardiff is the most awarded area in Wales, with 35 awarded sites in total (16 Full Awarded sites and 19 Community Awarded sites)
- 79.1% of all respondents were satisfied with Cardiff's Parks and Open Spaces in the 2020 Ask Cardiff Survey
- Respondents from most deprived areas were least likely to be satisfied with Cardiff's Parks and Open Spaces (67.5%)

Flooding

Key Points:

- Over 30,000 residential properties in Cardiff are currently at some level of flood risk. Of the 33 areas in Wales identified at most risk from flooding, 5 are within Cardiff: St. Mellons, Roath, Canton, Riverside and Grangetown (Communities at Risk Register, Wales) and within the city's Southern Arc'. 83% of properties within NRW's designated Flood Warning Areas within Cardiff are linked to its Flood Warning Service.
- Climate change associated impacts will increase the number of properties, infrastructure and key services at risk of flooding from all sources. Places not previously at risk could become vulnerable and many currently at risk could be of greater risk. It is expected that severe events such as the 2020 storms will become more common with increased severity and frequency of flooding. Climate change impacts will also increase the risk to flood defence assets and the costs to maintain them to acceptable standards. Some of Cardiff's defences are likely to require significant improvements.
- It will not be possible to prevent all flooding; there is therefore a need to use a range of adaptive approaches. However, the rate of adaptation action needs to quicken in order to keep pace with the increasing impacts of climate change.



Flood Risk Assessment Wales Map: Cardiff



Municipal Waste Reuse/ Recycling/ Composting Rates

Key Points:

- Cardiff is the worst performing local authority in Wales but outperforms the UK's Core Cities and Edinburgh. The gap between Cardiff and the Wales average has widened in recent years
- Cardiff's rate has remained fairly stagnant since 2015/16 but has dipped over the last two years. in 2018/19, the percentage of municipal waste reused/ recycled/ composted was 59.2%, whereas in 2020/21 it was 55.8%. This is below Welsh Government's target of 64% by 2020 and 70% by 2025.


Modernising and Integrating Our Public Services



How Satisfied are you with the Quality of Public Services in Cardiff?

Key Points:

- 2020 figures are no longer comparable to previous years due to a change in the wording of the question
- In 2020, nearly 73% of Cardiff's surveyed residents reported being either very or fairly satisfied with the quality of public services in Cardiff. Satisfaction with the quality of public services in Cardiff has had minor increases and decreases since 2014, but it has stayed broadly consistent.
- Satisfaction in Cardiff's public services has been maintained despite significant budgetary cuts during this period, which has likely been made possible by the adoption of new and more efficient ways of working, namely the integration of digital technology in the Council's service delivery.
