1.	Welcome/ Apologies	
	The Chair opened the meeting and noted apologies as above.	
2.	Minutes and Actions

	 Minutes of the previous meeting held on 5 October 2022 were approved, with a minor amendment to a Board Member's job title. 	
	Matters Arising:	
	The Chair highlighted that most actions were complete, except for the following, which will be completed shortly:	
	 The findings of the Ask Cardiff Survey – as well as other relevant surveys undertaken – will be reported to the PSB in February 2023. This will ensure that the PSB's new Well-being Plan and priorities align with issues identified by citizens. Cardiff Council's Fostering Friendly policy to be shared with PSB Members for consideration. At the last meeting of the PSB, it was agreed that each partner organisation will implement signposting arrangements – to cost of living crisis support – for residents. PSB Members were asked to ensure that their Communications Officers are aware of the support available, so that they can appropriately promote it. 	
3.	Partnership Governance Arrangements	
	Gareth Newell provided the PSB with an update on the work undertaken to review partnership governance arrangements. The aim of the review is to ensure that the governance arrangements are set up to deliver the PSB's new priorities as outlined in the draft Well-being Plan.	
	 The findings of the review were highlighted in the presentation, these are summarised below. Partnership working has worked well Effective partnership arrangements are needed, more than ever to solve complex public service problems. 	

No. Agenda Item There is a commitment from public services leaderships to work together • The current landscape is complex, leading to duplication of governance and activity. • There is a need to focus on "system issues" that can only be addressed through partnership working. • The partnership arrangements are to focus on tackling issues identified in the Wellbeing Plan/Area Plan. PSB priorities were identified as - Climate Emergency Assets and Infrastructures - Health Inequalities - Community Safety and Safeguarding - Task & Finish/ responding to issues Fiona Kinghorn complimented the team on a complex piece of work and highlighted that the commissioning piece - of the Cardiff & Vale Substance Misuse Area Planning Board - needs further consideration as it doesn't sit well under the community safety lens. Amelia John agreed that the presentation would be shared with WG colleagues in order to highlight the complexity of the landscape. Charles Janczewski added that he would be keen to ensure that the PSB doesn't just receive information, but also looks at outcomes and where value can be added. The Chair noted that the structure had been discussed with the Police and Crime Commissioner. Abigail Harris added her support to keeping the themes. Sheila Hendrickson-Brown highlighted the need to understand the role for the third sector. The Chair thanked attendees for their contributions and highlighted the need to consider how the PSB and RPB work together, the need for assurance around delivering change through effective data, and the need

4. One Planet Cardiff Update

PSB members received a presentation providing an update on the One Planet Programme and the work of the Climate Emergency Board (CEB). The presentation highlighted the following:

- The CEB's mandate and purpose
- Feedback from CEB Members what's gone well/could be improved.
- Updates from key groups including fleet, estates
- Importance of behaviour change
- Areas for collaboration

PSB Members were requested to:

- Confirm interest in the suggested projects
- Nominate a Director-level Champion and key participants
- Ensure clear organisational alignment at senior level governance and decision-making processes
- Commit to providing a "Fighting fund" (£20k each pa?) for a funded Co-Ordinator and bespoke research where necessary
- Agree to set clear project and organisational/partnership targets
- Agree participation in the forthcoming Cardiff Climate Convention

Michael Evans thanked the One Planet Team for the energy they brought to the Board and highlighted the need to ensure that the difficult decisions needed are taken.

The Chair acknowledged that collective effort was needed, as some current proposals are only impacting at the margins. Furthermore, some of the bigger impacting proposals will require partners to take difficult decisions.

Suzanne Rankin added her support with Abigail Harris being lead director for the UHB and noted that the decision with regard to financial contribution would need to be taken off-line for further consideration given budgetary pressures across the board.

Amelia John highlighted that a fighting fund had made a massive difference in delivery of Welsh Government objectives.

Fiona Kinghorn referenced that the 2023 Director of Public Health report could be focussed on this topic.

AGREED:

- The requests highlighted above were agreed with further discussion and detail required around the fighting fund.
- Consideration be given to next year's Director of Public Health report being focussed on the climate emergency.

6.	Child Friendly City Update	
	 The PSB received a presentation providing an update on the Child Friendly Cardiff Strategy. The presentation included: Timeline of the road to recognition The measurable progress in the delivery phase Details of Cardiff's Road to Recognition Details of the Children and Young People Evaluation Committee Expect outcome of assessment in February 2023 	
	Lee Patterson put forward a proposal for the PSB to convene an annual, day-long event which would enable children and young people to share their priorities with the PSB, in the context of the PSB Wellbeing Plan. The first part of the event would bring young representatives from across public services together for a series of workshops, with PSB members joining young people for the second half of the event, to discuss the findings of the morning session and to take part in a structured dialogue session.	
	The Chair queried whether there was a wide cross section of representation to ensure that marginalised voices are heard. Lee Patterson confirmed that young people have been approached from care experienced backgrounds, asylum, and additional learning needs. Sheila Hendrickson-Brown offered her assistance with reaching those young people who may be marginalised.

7.	Community Safety Update	
	Sian Sanders provided the following update:	
	 Serious Violence Duty is set for 30 January 2023. Our response to the Duty has already commenced, with a Problem Profile being created with assistance from VPU, SWP, and CVUHB. Cardiff CSP are looking to use this to shape a Local Delivery Plan by the end of December 2023. Problem Solving Group is currently working on the following community projects: Clifton Street, Anderson Fields, Cowbridge Road East. All aimed at tackling a number of key complex issues in the community. Street Based lifestyles and Complex Needs Priority Group: Focus is on refreshing core objectives, revisit Tents Protocol ensuring fit for purpose, focused on issues surrounding supported accommodation, ensuring alignment with dedicated substance misuse support provision. Prevent- developing new bid for 2023-2024 Regional Safeguarding Board- completing quick Task & Finish learning from the Logan Mwangi Child Practice Review, which has recently been published by Bridgend, to review the recommendations and consider any which apply locally and can be immediately actioned. 	
8.	The letter received from the Police Review and Performance Scrutiny Committee was presented. The letter contains the following recommendations: • That the culture and successes of all PSB's are celebrated by Welsh Government and the FGC, and where good practice is in clear evidence it is shared across Wales. • That the collaborative successes of the PSB are celebrated more visibly, particularly where a significant public challenge has been overcome. • That you to continue to improve the quality of data held on minority populations to support consultation reach, clarify your plans to mitigate for communities that do not engage, and ensure we have enough data to plan ahead effectively.
